Curricular Aspects

The institution is affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi university Kottayam. It follows the curriculum and syllabus designed by the university for all UG and PG programs. At present the institution has 10 UG and one PG program. All the programs we follow CBCS scheme. In addition to the elective courses, we offer add- on courses and certificate programs to promote employability of the students. In the academic year 2022 -2023 the college offers 34 add on courses and 404 students enrolled for the same

- Prosecuting issues like professional ethics, gender equality, human values ,environment and sustainability are addressed in the different courses of each program.
- At the beginning of the first year batch bridge programs are organised for first year students every year, and slow and advanced learners are identified.
- For evaluation process of daily classes, daily workload statements of individual faculty members are kept in the department.
- Feedback from various stakeholders are collected, evaluated and published on the institution website.
- Most of the teachers are familiar with ICT methods and use LMS path platforms like Google classrooms, WhatsApp, Google meet,, Google Jam Board etc.
- Academic calendar is a tentative plan of action including both academic and non-academic activities to be conducted in an academic year.
- The Internal examination committee of the institution ensures a clear and transparent system in the

student's continuous evaluation process.

- A regular study center of IGNOU is working in the college campus for those who cannot attend regular classes
- The UG programs offered in the institution are multidisciplinary in nature.
- All the programs offered in the institution are having internships or projects work.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	St Antony's College Peruvanthanam is a self- financing college under MG University Kottayam never hesitates to welcome and adopt new and emerging trends in academic world. In tune with the vision of NEP, college strives to provide high quality education for students. The curriculum of all UG programmes offered by the college follows the Choice Based Credit and Semester (CBCS). The institution aims to create well educated, socially responsible, knowledgeable young adults and make them successful in life. Various academic programs offered by the college are in the disciplines of Management, Science, Commerce and Literature. Thr ough NSS and extracurricular activities, students get t o learn about being involved in the community and so cial service. For the curriculum to be successfully co mpleted, each college student must complete a requir ed project. In terms of both nature and substance, new generation programs include BCA, BSc Cyber F orensic, BBA, BFT, BSc Hotel Management, and B Com Logistics Management Students are encouraged to undertake projects in multidisciplinary areas. The college provides Certificate courses and add on programmes for academic and vocational needs of the students. The college opted for a variety of open courses for final year students. The open courses that are provided by all departments in the fifth semester are one of the clearest examples of how the affiliating
	institution as well as the college have integrated interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approaches to the curriculum. In this context, it is vital to include practical and experiential learning in both conventional and advanced programs.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Implementation of ABC depends on the rules and regulations of the affiliating university. The institution is ready to be a part of ABC once it is implemented by the University. Even now the college acts as NPTEL local chapter since 2023. Students are being informed about National Education Policy and Academic bank of Credits.
3. Skill development:	Skill development programs help students fill ability gaps and offer job training benefits. Institution implement these programs, including career and placement cells, ED clubs, and incubation clubs, to support students' abilities and provide guidance. The college also hosts sports and cultural activities to help

	students develop their skills. These programs aim to recognize students' abilities and provide support for their future endeavors.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The promotion of Indian arts and culture is valuable to both the country and the person. The institution is organizing programs to promote literature, the arts, and other forms of culture. It has also taken excellent measures to incorporate Indian knowledge systems throughout its teaching and learning practices. Different programmes offered in the college have courses that integrates Indian language system to the curriculum. The BFT and B Com Cooperation organises different programs like craft documentation, workshops seminars etc apart from the courses that integrates Indian language and culture.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The College is following the syllabi framed by the affiliating university. The Course Outcome (CO), Programme Outcome (PO), and Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO) are explained well in the syllabi of all programmes and they are shared with students through the college website and the teachers handling various courses.
6. Distance education/online education:	In today's educational climate, technology-enhanced learning is becoming more and more crucial. As an affiliated college, there isn't ample opportunity for providing distance or online learning. Even though to promote distance education the institution has a resistered IGNOU Regular Study Center with (Reg. No .14186) The pandemic created the opportunity to deliver classes online. The institution uses a blended learning approach to deliver Add on Programs and Certificate Courses. The institution encourages staff and students to take SWAYAM and NPTEL, Alison online certification courses as part of its promotion of online education. The faculty in the institution is giving assignments and other works in online mode.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Curriculum is the central guide for all educators to what is essential for teaching and learning, so that every student has access to rigorous academic experiences. As a part of curriculum planning the syllabus is divided among teachers in the department and the time-bound completion is ensured by the respective HoDs. Teachers are instructed to deliver the curriculum in accordance with the teaching plan. Students are made aware of the POs and COs at the beginning of the course.

Academic calendar

An academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of every academic year . The College staff Council appoints a teacher in charge to prepare the college calendar. He will do it in time in consultation with the Principal, IQAC Coordinator and HODs of various Departments. After the completion of the academic calendar each department is asked to prepare an action plan in accordance with general academic calendar.

Internal Examination

There is an Internal Examination cell for ensuring the quality of Internal Examinations. The college is conducting one module examination and one model examination in university pattern. Publications of the internal marks, forwarding them to the respective Departments, uploading the marks etc. are closely under the guidance and supervision of the Principal and department heads. There is a **Grievance Redress System** in the college exclusively for solving the issues related to internal marks. The institution is conducting class wise PTA for the evaluation of performance of students in the internal examinations.

Teacher's Diary helps the college to analyse daily work progress of teachers' work

Seminars / Assignments

UG and PG students are given seminars/assignments under the guidance of faculty members. The students are encouraged to attend various seminars outside the campus.

Students' feedback

Students' feedback is collected from students under department level. The feedback from students are discussed in Department staff meetings and corrective steps are taken.

Project

Project is done by each student under the supervision of a guide as part of the curriculum. It enables him/her to get a deep insight into the subject content.

Internship

The institution is conducting internship program for the students of various streams. This will help the student to get an exposure other than the campus.

Study tours

Study tours are conducted for UG and PG students in which they visit places and institutions of academic relevance.

Skill development

Students and teachers are encouraged to take part in seminars, conferences and competitions to update their knowledge in the subject. Additional Skill Acquisition Programmes like Certificate courses, software training programmes are implemented for developing the academic skills and for enhancing the performance of the students and teachers.

Remedial coaching

In Remedial coaching, special classes are given to needy students in which under-achievers are given personal attention.

Special classes are also arranged for the timely completion of the curriculum content.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The Academic premises strictly follows the rules and regulations specified by the Mahatma Gandhi University in connection with Internal evaluation and External evaluation of progress of the students. It involves its own mechanism to ensure transparency and fairness in awarding internal and external marks of students.

The following is the marking scheme of providing internal and external evaluation of the university.

External marks for UG courses = 80 marks and 75 marks for PG courses.

Internal Marks for UG courses = 20 marks and 25 marks for PG courses.

Division of Internal Marks out of 20 (5 marks for assignments, 5 marks for attendance, 10 marks for internal examinations)

Internal Assessment

The following measures are taken by the institution on this regard:

Teachers conduct a minimum of **two internal examinations** over a semister and record the marks secured by each student, which form a major component of internal marks. Internal evaluation includes internal examination, seminar or assignment and classroom participation. The overall performance of the student and participation in classroom activities are also given due weightage. Moreover, the college has a centralized internal examination for each semester. Marks/grades awarded to students as per the given criteria are recorded. Marks for segments of attendance, tests , presentations and seminars are added

together and consolidated. Internal marks are published in the respective department notice boards. The final Internal mark list is published and made available for verification by the students. Later the same mark list is uploaded to the University website as required.

Grievances Redressal on Internal Assessment

The Internal Assessment process is strictly guided by Internal Examamination Committee (IEC) of the college. Students are given enough time to raise their grievances on Internal assessment. They can approach the concerned teacher. Most of the grievances and concerns are redressed at this level. If the student is not satisfied at this stage the Head of the Department is the next authority to be approached. If the claims of the students are found to be genuine the HOD or the Principal may make necessary changes in the marks. If the student is not satisfied with this, they can approach the University for the Redressal.

External Assessment

The external assessment of the student is assessed by the semester examination conducted by the University. The University timely evaluate examination paper through Centralised Valuation Camp(CVC). Teachers from all the institutions will participate in the camp. After the evaluation of the paper, the University will publish the result through its website. Grievances Redressal on External Assessment Grievance regarding external assessment is done through the university portal by the student itself. When the university result is published, students who have grievance on their external mark has to register their names in the university students portal by online payment of prescribed fee within 14days after the publishing of result. University will later inform the students regarding their grievance.

Seminars and workshops on **Bloom's Taxonomy** and assessment practices are conducted for teachers to make them understand the objectives of classroom teaching and sharpen their critical thinking.

Programme Outcomes are the main goals are the information, attitudes and abilities that student must achieve at the completion of the programme.

Programme Specific Outcomes are the statements that describe what the graduates of a specific program should be able to perform.

Course Outcomes depict what a student knows and what they are capable of doing after the completion of their course.

Communication to Teachers

In order to teach instructors how Bloom's Cognitive Domains are realistically handled in classrooms in order to make students' learning outcomes, instructional activities, assessments, and examinations, the institution runs faculty development courses and seminars connected to outcome-based education.

1. IQAC orgainsed seminar on OBE to all the faculty

2. Online and Offline classes are provided to the faculty regarding assessments of course outcome

3. Interdepartmental mentoring team is formed to measure the learning outcomes.

Communication to Students

Students' attainment of Course Outcome is evaluated primarily through the Direct and Indirect Methods.

The **Direct Method** includes the following components:

- Internal examination Questions are set to identify the corresponding COs.
- External Examination- University examination results are also considered for assessing the attainment.
- Assignments: Course outcome attainment is assessed through assignments
- Seminars: Post Graduate students are asked to prepare and present seminars to analyse CO attainment.
- Viva-voce. Viva- voce conducted by external examinar is also a method to measure the attainment of CO
- Project/ Dissertation work. The score attained for project / Dissertation work done by the students can be considered for the evaluation attainment of CO.
- Practical examinations. Another direct method to analyse the attainment of CO are the marks scored for the practical examinations.
- Student participation in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities also help assess the attainment of POs and COs.
- Out Come Based Tests conducted at the end of every course.
- Extension activities:- The voluntary activities done by the students have direct linkage with the CO.

The attainment of PO and PSO are assessed through Indirect Method

Exit Survey:- The institution conduct Exit survey among the final year students after completing their programme . The result received from the final year batches at the end of the programme from all departments is considered to be the comprehensive feedback for the PO/PSO assessment. It gives an opportunity for the institution to know the level of attainment of course outcome to the students.

Alumni feedback annually collected alumni through online forms is used to understand whether the desired outcomes are attained.

Employer feedback :- Feedback is requested from the employer in order to determine whether the employee has achieved the intended results and can hence operate practically as an ideal employee in their ind ividual jobs.

Placement and Progression to higher studies: The placement of students in reputed firms and their progression to higher studies in esteemed institutions is a legit way to quantitatively measure the achievement of Program Objectives.

Examination Room: The college is having a special room for the functioning of exam-related activities like printing of University Exam question papers.

Specific rooms are available for counseling, Ladies' Rest room and Women cell, IQAC, NSS, Incubation Center room, Sports, and Security room.

Power Supply: The institution has a three-phase power supply connection with a Special 110 KV Transformer and a battery power backup system in the office.

To keep up with changing academic trends and to accommodate students who are technologically advanced, the College has consistently expanded its IT infrastructure. The College, founded in 2013, has been integrating all technology breakthroughs into its organisational framework of daily operation. The institution keeps a website, a youtube channel, and social media pages that make public the activities and events taking place at the college.

The College offers a nicely equipped computer lab run by ONE professional, with 58 computers .Apart from that 4 laptops and 3 computers are provided for faculty access. The Lab serves the academic and professional needs of students as well as teachers. The centre offers students services like printing and photocopying, among others. Students to fill out online applications for jobs, apply for further education, access educational resources, gather materials for seminars, assignments, projects, dissertations, etc use the computer lab.

Institution has 1 Server, Six UPSs and one 30 KVA generator

The computer Lab is equipped with software of different levels to cater to the needs of advanced and

medium learners. There is also specially designed software suitable for beginners. There is also NVDA software installed for supporting differently abled students.

The automation process of the Library has almost been completed. The library is automated using KOHA software.

By incorporating the admissions procedure, Fee payment, and attendance system, the office automation process has been upgraded with a new ERP introduced in the year 2022. Training on e-governance and technology adoption is imparted to academic and administrative staff on a regular basis. The Office is well-equipped with different computer systems, photocopiers, desktop printers, Wi-fi printers, and one ID card printing machine.

The College has a well-equipped, fully air-conditioned seminar hall with 100 seats that is maintained by a technician who also maintains its audio-visual, lecture recording, and video recording equipment.

The entire campus is Wi-Fi equipped, providing all departments access to the internet at a 100 Mbps speed. In order to accommodate all of the College's IT requirements, the College relies on a number of network providers with the best speed. The college now has 3 Internet connections: BSNL, Asianet, and DWAN with 200 Mbps, 50 Mbps, and 300 Mbps respectively.

Mail and other electronic media are used to communicate with departments and students the most. The college adheres to the principles of the green protocol by using public speech and public display technologies. For the seamless operation of the College, there are various WhatsApp groups for teachers, non-teaching staff, the HOD, students, etc.

There are three smart classrooms and a computer with internet access. The college also has two portable projectors. As a result, the Institution is always prepared to upgrade its IT infrastructure. Smart classrooms offer students access to the most recent cutting-edge technical assistance.

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

St. Antony's College Peruvanthanam, a self-financing institution affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam, was founded in 2013. The college has a Vision and Mission that focuses on innovative approaches for quality teaching and learning in the institution. The structure, administrative and academic setup of the college is as follows:

Chairman and Governing Body

The Chairman is the administrative head and the manager of the institution who is the appointing authority of the same. The College has a Governing Body, which meets periodically and taken major Policy decisions in the meeting.

Principal

The Principal is the academic and the chief executive authority of the College in the day-to-day affairs and is assisted by the Vice Principals, Staff Council, and IQAC. He consults the Management, Staff council, and other functional committees for various matters.

College Council

College Council is the apex advisory body that takes all the policy decisions regarding the College. The decision of the Council will be implemented through the different agencies formed by the Council. It consists of Principal, Vice Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, all the Heads of the Departments, the Senior Superintendent, and one elected /nominated member from the teaching staff.

The Vice-Principal(s) discharges the duties of the Principal in his absence and helps the Principal in all the day-to-day affairs of the College.

Head of the Departments

The head of the Department is responsible for the preparation of the Department time table, subject allocation among teachers of the concerned department ,review of the Teacher's Diary, conducting internal examinations and the submission of various reports to the Principal and to the IQAC.

Class teachers are assigned for each class to ensure personal care, attention, guidance, counseling, evaluation, and assessment of each student in the class. He/She is responsible for class discipline, attendance and absence of students, consolidating internal marks and preparing the reports to be sent to the University.

IQAC

The IQAC functions effectively to assist the Principal to enhance and sustain a strategy of quality and excellence of the college. The IQAC members are selected from teaching staff, supporting staff, students, alumni, industrialists etc. Regular IQAC meetings are conducted to discuss issues related to quality improvement.

Admission Committee takes care of all the procedures related to UG, and PG admissions as per university instructions and Government norms.

Examination committee headed by a nominated member of staff, monitors the effective conduct of university examinations and centralized internal examinations.

Grievance Redressal: A Grievance Redressal Cell is working in the College, headed by the Vice-Principal and two senior teachers. An Anti-Ragging cell has been functioning in the College to monitor any sexual harassment against a woman and ensure the safety of all students. The College also has a Discipline committee too, headed by the Vice-Principal. To empower girls students, the College has a Women's Cell Forum. The forum consists of all girls students and lady teachers of the College.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

As the college is a self-financing college owned and managed by St Antonys Charitable Society, So it has to find its own means of resources to meet its developmental needs. The college has an efficient financial system to manage its day to activities and mobilize resources in an efficient manner. The governing body constituted the finance department under the leadership of Chairman Mr.Benny Thomas and Secretary Mr.Tijomon Jacob. This department drafted policy to realize different means of financial resources available, for the efficient use and management of funds.

The following are the major procedures followed for the efficient collection and utilization of funds:

- 1. The optimal utilization of the funds shall be monitored by the college governing body
- 2. The secretary in consultation with the chairman shall be responsible for the allocation and management of funds
- 3. The internal and external auditors shall be appointed by the Governing body
- 4. Management Shall provide funds for faculty developments programs and provident funds and ESI

The prime financial sources of the college include Tuition fees collected from students, development loans from the Management/chairman, Endowments and scholarships of students, University grants Of NSS, University funding for the conduct of exams, contributions from teachers in case of special needs of teachers and students and college bus fees.

Fees charged as per University and government norms are utilised for direct expenses of courses and colleges. The college development fund from the Chairman is utilised for the developmental activities undertaken by the college including infrastructural development. A share of this is also allocated for scholarships and endowments to deserving students. Advances were given to different departments, and associations for conducting seminars, programs, workshops, etc for the skill development of students. Funds are provided for library development, the purchase of equipment for providing ICT-enabled facilities. Management's development fund is utilised for organising seminars, workshops, FDPs, research, and paper presentations for enhancing the professional and academic quality enhancement of teachers. Contributions from teachers for special needs were disposed to deserving students at the time of natural calamities.

The regular external audit conducted by the institution states its transparency in financial matters. The financial statements are certified by the audit firm and audit reports are issued every year. In case of any objections, systematic follow-up actions are initiated to rectify them. The heads of the departments and the coordinators of various units submit the accounts of expenditure to the office for auditing if any.

Further, they were advised to document such allocations properly. Consequently, all departments follow this and all portions are taught timely

c) Portion Completion Report: The IQAC proposed to make it mandatory that each teacher submits Portion Completion Report to the HODs at the end of each semester.

d) **Periodic Review Meetings:** To ensure the effective implementation of the academic study plan, the departments are advised to discuss the progress of teaching and learning. Also advised to conduct department meetings periodically.

e) Systematic Documentation: A proper documentation system is a challenge for any institution. To meet this challenge, the IQAC has taken a leading role in implementing a well-organized and labeled filing system in the college.

Title of the Practice: CARE AND SHARE

CARE AND SHARE is a philanthropic project of St. Antony's College Peruvanthanam to popularize palliative care among the student community, which enable them to participate actively in community life and thus acting as a companion to the fellow citizens.

CARE: As a part of the missionary services of Late Rev. Dr. Antony Nirappel, the founder director of the college, the "CARE" is an attempt to improve the quality of people with life-limiting or disabling diseases. The NSS unit of St. Antony's college Peruvanthanam is engaged in organizing affordable support for this program which provides palliative care for the needy people in the locality of Kokkayar and Peruvanthanam Panchayat.

SHARE: "SHARE" is a ray of comfort initiated under the supervision of entire college community, to provide a helping hand for the old citizens in the old age home Shantinilayam, in Yenthayar Kottayam District by delivering meal once in a week.

Objectives of the Practice

CARE

- To ensure students participation in Palliative care units.
- To generate a perception in students on social and civic responsibilities.
- To assist bed-ridden patients in the locality through home care services.
- To offer relief from pain and promote the health through frequent physical care and emotional support.

SHARE

- To develop humane qualities among students.
- To promote sharing mentality and Social and Environmental sensitivity among young community.
- To provide assistance in the rehabilitation of the patients.
- To encourage community participation in the palliative care activities.
- To create a sense of family environment and togetherness in inhabitants.

The Context

The social service unit CARE AND SHARE under the supervision of National Service Scheme is established in the year of 2022.

CARE. To enable the students to become a responsible empathetic citizen of the nation, the Peermade Taluk Hospital provided palliative training session for the selected 37 NSS volunteers. The trained NSS students initiated visiting the bed ridden patients in the Peruvanthanam Panchayat and Kokkayar Panchayatand gave the palliative service to the needed.

SHARE. In the context of the flood and Covid pandemic situation, Shantinilayam, an old age homes in Yenthayar, requested the college to lend a hand for the welfare inmates. Therefore, the management and student council took a decision to deliver meals to the inmates every Wednesday.

The Practice

The trained NSS volunteers in association with the Health Department Peermade Taluk Hospital engaged in care and assistance for the palliative patients. The volunteers received expert training in health care and hygiene from the nearby health department.

The members of SHARE collect homemade meals from students and teachers in all Wednesdays on an average of 45 meals on rotation base and distibute to the inmates. The members conduct programmes for the old citizens frequently which is an opportunity for the concerned people and the society to appreciate the youth joining hands with the elderly people with love and care.

The Evidence of Success

- CARE AND SHARE project successfully completed one academic year.
- The leading newspaper Malayala Manorama Reported the Project.
- Appreciation letters were given by the Old Age Home, Peerumade Taluk Hospital ,acknowledging the co-operation of college and students.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Lack of trained students.
- Unexpected holidays and Semester Examinations.

BEST PRACTICE -2

Title of the Practice: SHE WARRIORS

SHE WARRIORS is a self defense training programme organized by ESPOIR, the women's cell of St. Antony's College Peruvanthanam, which provides self-defense classes to the female students of the college. Self-defense training can improve physical fitness, mental resilience, and overall well-being.

Objectives of the Practice

- To empower girl students with self-defense skills and increase their confidence levels.
- To teach effective self-defense techniques and strategies that can be used in a variety of situations.
- To promote physical fitness, flexibility, and mental discipline among girl students .
- To raise awareness among female students about various safety measures and precautions.
- To cultivate a sense of teamwork and mutual respect among girl students by practicing together.

The Context

SHE WARRIORS is a self-defense training program designed to instill confidence and preparedness in female students, benefiting their academics, careers, and personal relationships. The college's commitment to empowering female students physically and mentally, while fostering a supportive social environment, aims to equip them with self-defense techniques, enhance their physical fitness, and build confidence and self-esteem through mastering new skills and techniques.

The Practice

ESPOIR, The Women Empowerment Cell of the college commenced self-defense training classes for female students on 14th February 2022. The classes are held once a week, with each session lasting an hour, led by trained students The first batch had fifteen students, but gradually the number increased, and 25 students participated in the 2023 session. Girls from different departments of our college attend the classes, which cover a syllabus that includes basic exercises, kicks, punches, self-defense attacks, knife attacks, and stick rotations and attacks.

Classes start with a warm-up session, stretching and jogging, followed by various techniques like punches, kicks, and blocks. They focus on improving fitness, strength, and endurance, with proper posture and breathing techniques.

Evidence of Success

- The self defense training classes for the girl students in the college have been successful in attracting a significant number of students.
- The number of students participating in the classes has increased over time, from 15 in the first batch to 27 in the 2023 session.
- The programme has successfully completed two batches, indicating a sustained interest in the classes and their benefits among the students.
- The positive feedback and progress of the participants demonstrate the effectiveness of the training in enhancing their self-defense skills, physical fitness, and confidence.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Due to ignorance, parents of girls from disadvantaged areas may show opposition or show little interest in attending lessons.
- Lack of spacious classrooms or special rooms for conducting such sessions.
- Course duration and student tight class schedules make finding inconvenient to attend the classes
- Low female participation and shortage of trained students hinder college's training efforts.
